TO: Brokers, Importers, Carriers and Other Interested Parties

SUBJECT: Guidance for Certificate of Reimbursement

The Department of Commerce (DOC) regulations require that the importer submit, prior to liquidation and the assessment of antidumping (AD) duties, a certificate advising whether or not the importer has entered into an agreement or otherwise has received reimbursement for AD duties. In accordance with 19 CFR 351.402, failure to file this certificate will result in the doubling of antidumping duties.

Importers and brokers are strongly encouraged, as their responsibilities under the Mod Act, to submit reimbursement certificates for any entries subject to antidumping which have not yet liquidated.

The certificates may take the form of an individual certificate or a blanket certificate. Please note that all information must be provided on the certificate, including the specific antidumping case number, the shipper and the review period covered.
